



### **Networks by the Numbers**


How many individuals are in your network?

### Coordination and Funding

### 13 networks receive funding via:

- government grants
- local health foundations and other local funders
- partnerships with network member agencies
- backbone agency general funds

Examples: FACT; Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services; Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development; Community Services Boards; Partners in Prevention Fund; United Way

### How are networks coordinated/managed without a paid coordinator?

For some, the work of coordinating the network included as part of their paid job within the backbone agency as the work aligns, but also many volunteer hours

#### **GENERAL MEETINGS**

- bi-monthly, monthly, quarterly
- some have standing meetings (eg; the 4th Tuesday of every month at 10:00-12:00)

#### **ADDITIONAL STRUCTURES**

- Subgroups (eg: Integrated Health Collaborative; Coalition for Trauma-Informed Housing & Homeless Services; ACE Interface Presenters Learning Community
- Stakeholders meet regularly through variety of other councils, task forces, and teams, including evidence-based practice team, LGBTQ task force, opioid task force, suicide task force, and resource council

### **CHALLENGES & BARRIERS**

- pandemic-related trauma, stress, and upheaval (including loss of in-person gatherings)
- lack of funding and staff
- leadership and membership capacity
- need for clarity/focus within a large group vision
- transitions within leadership and backbone agency
- how to engage community members and professionals outside human services
- lack of trainers

#### **RESPONSES**

- acknowledging and addressing the impacts of the pandemic
- finding creative ways to engage virtually
- strategizing actions toward inclusivity (eg: working with task forces and organizations with authentic relationships in the community)
- hosting more communitybased activities and events, such as film screenings
- host train the trainer events to build trainer capacity

### Accomplishments & Highlights

- Resilience Week VA: Diverse programming, community stories, social media engagement, dynamic presentations
- Participation in Racial Truth & Reconciliation Week VA
- The RAISE Trauma & Resiliency Summit
- Completing equity assessments
- Developing and sharing trauma-informed resources to address COVID-19
- Being awarded funding from FACT to provide direct assistance to families in need through the network

- Staying connected and continuing to meet despite all the challenges of the pandemic
- Launching new trauma-informed leadership teams, all-member meetings, trainings, eNotes, and websites
- Being featured in local news
- Increasing membership
- Building a presence on social media
- Building support within different systems (schools, healthcare, etc)
- Training cohorts of ACE Interface trainers
- Creating new committees within the network
- Developing and formalizing strategic plans and MOUs

### Creating Diverse & Inclusive Networks

- ASSESSING MEMBERSHIP TO IDENTIFY GAPS (SOME COMMON SECTORS MISSING: AGING, BUSINESS, FAITH, LAW ENFORCEMENT, YOUTH)
  - MAKING DIVERSITY & INCLUSION AN EXPLICIT PART OF A NETWORK'S STRATEGIC PLAN
  - INTRODUCING DEI FRAMEWORKS TO NETWORK
- CULTIVATING PARTNERSHIPS WITH LOCAL
   ORGANIZATIONS/GROUPS WHO ARE NOT YET PART OF THE
   NETWORK TO BUILD COALITION, COLLABORATE, AND
   AVOID DUPLICATING EFFORTS
  - CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR ENGAGEMENT OUTSIDE OF MEETINGS
  - ESTABLISHING A LIVED EXPERIENCE ADVISORY BOARD
  - ENCOURAGING OPEN COMMUNICATION AND CREATING SPACES FOR CONVERSATION

### Incorporating & Prioritizing Equity

- Elevating the voices and experiences of marginalized communities to promote healing, reconciliation and justice
  - Advancing policies that dismantle the systems that perpetuate racial trauma and inequity
  - Developing place-based strategies guided by residents
  - Collaborating with local government agencies and other organizations who are also focused on equity
  - Including education and information on racial and historical trauma and intergenerational trauma and resilience in trainings, workshops, campaigns and communications
  - Inviting speakers to general meetings to present on issues related to social justice
  - Working with Voices for Virginia's Children to complete an equity assessment, which will guide strategic planning
  - Centering race and providing clear, transparent information about the importance of centering race in resilience building
  - Promoting connectedness and coordinating resources to address social determinants of health, and collaborating to keep community members fed, healthy, housed, and free from the surveillance and criminalization of the carceral network

- interest in information about how the state is creating a plan to address trauma and how the governor's office is taking this information back to create an equity and wellbeing plan (as seen in NJ and PA)
- RAISE: Alexandria just adopted the <u>Children</u> and <u>Youth Master Plan 2025</u>, a plan that uses the "Pair of ACEs" tree to frame our work. The plan intentionally centers trauma, aces, developmental assets, and equity.

- some regions are especially siloed and coordinators experience pushback from agencies who are unwilling to collaborate; looking for ways to work through this
- how to find champions for the network whether that be others who could take on
   leadership roles in the network itself or who
   could lead within their fields/agencies
- interest in additional ways for networks to collaborate, support one another (following and resharing on social media, email outreach, etc)

Networks are diverse, in different stages of growth and responding to the unique needs of their regions. Networks share much in common as well. We can honor our differences and avoid comparison while sharing resources and strategies.

Change is constant and networks continue to adapt to meet emerging issues, individually and collectively.

Every step toward a more trauma-informed community is an important step, however large or small.
